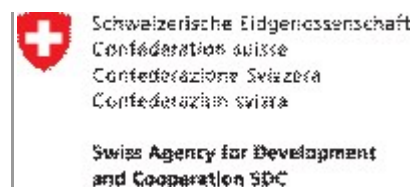




Dear reader,

## Switzerland's international cooperation: the 2017–2020 Dispatch

In its Dispatch, the Federal Council sets out the strategic direction that development cooperation will take, including economic and trade policy measures. It aims in particular to strengthen emergency humanitarian aid, as well as Switzerland's contribution to conflict resolution. Civilian peacebuilding is also incorporated into the strategy for the first time.

## Romania: microfinance saves jobs

Thanks to a microcredit of EUR 7,000, a Moldovan family's musical instruments business has been able to improve productivity and employ staff on a permanent basis. In Romania, small business owners find it difficult to secure loans, especially if they belong to the Roma minority. Switzerland is supporting a microfinance programme which benefits the Roma people as well as other disadvantaged groups.
